Accomplishments and Impact

- The new state-based HAI prevention program has led to significant advances in state infrastructure and state engagement in efforts to prevent these infections. For example, all 50 states have now hired a state HAI coordinator.
- More than 20 states have established multi-facility prevention projects designed to reduce infections in hospitals.
- Secured funding to bring external experts to CDC to advise the agency on activities that will improve in-patient antibiotic use.
- Secured funding and now leading a collaborative project with the Public Health Foundation and Institute for Healthcare Improvement to develop and pilot test a national “Driver Diagram and Change Package” to improve antibiotic use.
- Secured funding and now serving a project officer for a research project being done with The Center for Disease Dynamics and Economic Policy to better understand the reasons for in-patient antibiotic use and misuse

Accomplishments and Impact:

- Oversaw investigations and research activities on an emerging type of highly resistant bacteria in the United States, Carbapenem-Resistant Enterobacteriaceae. Recognized the public health threat of these pathogens and led the development of national prevention guidelines, which were endorsed by the Healthcare Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee.
- Supervised a national investigation of blood stream infections among patients receiving long-term infusions of medications to treat pulmonary hypertension. The investigation, published in the MMWR, demonstrated a higher infection rate associated with one particular drug and prompted FDA to make a label change about these potential infection risks.
- Supervised an investigation of infant deaths due to overdoses of cough and cold medications. The investigation, published in the MMWR, highlighted the potential dangers of giving these medications to infants and received extensive media coverage. The findings have also helped inform on-going FDA recommendations and regulatory actions regarding the use of cough and cold medications in children.
- Led a team of 1 medical officer and 1 microbiologist to assist staff at Walter Reed Army Medical Center prevent transmission of a highly drug-resistant bacteria (*Acinetobacter baumannii*) among injured US service members.

- Supervised 3 medical officers on an investigation of a nationwide outbreak of *Ralstonia* bacteria. The investigation determined that a contaminated respiratory device, used primarily for critically ill newborns, was the likely source. Officer facilitated interactions with the Food and Drug Administration to assist their regulatory actions on the device. The findings of the investigation led to a nationwide recall of 5000 devices from 900 healthcare facilities.
- Led several investigations of cases of Toxic Anterior Segment Syndrome, a sight-threatening inflammatory complication of cataract surgery. The investigation discovered an irrigation solution to be contaminated with endotoxin and led to a national recall of several hundred thousand units of the product. The investigation also highlighted national problems with the cleaning and disinfection of cataract surgery equipment. LCDR Srinivasan then worked with the American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery to develop national guidelines for cleaning and disinfecting this equipment which were published in 2007.
- Was the DHQP supervisor of collaborative DHQP-Mycotics Branch investigation of sight-threatening eye infections caused by *Fusarium* fungus. The investigation determined the infections were associated with a particular brand of contact lens solution and led to a worldwide market withdrawal of millions of bottles the solution

Accomplishments and Impact:

- Led the development of the Healthcare Preparedness and Response section of the national guidance document, “Public Health Guidance for Community Level Preparedness and Response to SARS”.
- Selected as a member of a Department of Health and Human Services Medical TIGER Team that was deployed to Athens, Greece to help Greek officials prepare for public health emergencies that might occur during the Olympic Games.
- Directed a nationwide investigation of over-the-counter nasal spray that was contaminated with *Burkholderia cepacia*, a potentially harmful bacteria. The investigation led to the recall of more than 30,000 bottles of the product that had been distributed throughout the country.
- Supervised an investigation that led to the first identification of transmission of group A streptococcus through transplantation of a tissue allograft.
- Led an investigation of the first ever reported cases of rabies virus transmission via organ transplantation. As part of the investigation, officer led an emergent field deployment to Dallas, TX where he directed the activities of a seven person investigation team.
- Department of Defense (DoD) *Acinetobacter* task force which has been established to investigate infections with a highly resistant bacteria among US service members injured in Iraq and Afghanistan. His participation on this task force was specifically sought by the office of Army Surgeon General. His contributions have included: helping develop infection control guidance for military medical facilities, helping develop research protocols to further the understanding of the organism in the combat and military medical settings, providing subject matter expertise to DoD and assisting with a report published in the MMWR to help educate clinicians and public about this problem.
- Led a nationwide investigation of intravenous catheter flush syringes contaminated with *Pseudomonas fluorescens*. The investigation led to a nationwide recall of hundreds of unit of the product and identified facilities that were not aware of the contamination and resulted in removal of the product from those facilities, thereby protecting additional patients from exposure. The investigation identified infections in more than 50 patients in 6 states.
- Led a nationwide investigation of cases of meningitis associated with myelogram procedures. Officer presented the findings of the investigation to the CDC’s Hospital Infection Control Practices Advisory Committee and proposed that the committee issue a new national recommendation that masks be worn by people performing these procedures. This proposal was unanimously approved by the committee and will be issued in a national guidance document in 2006.
